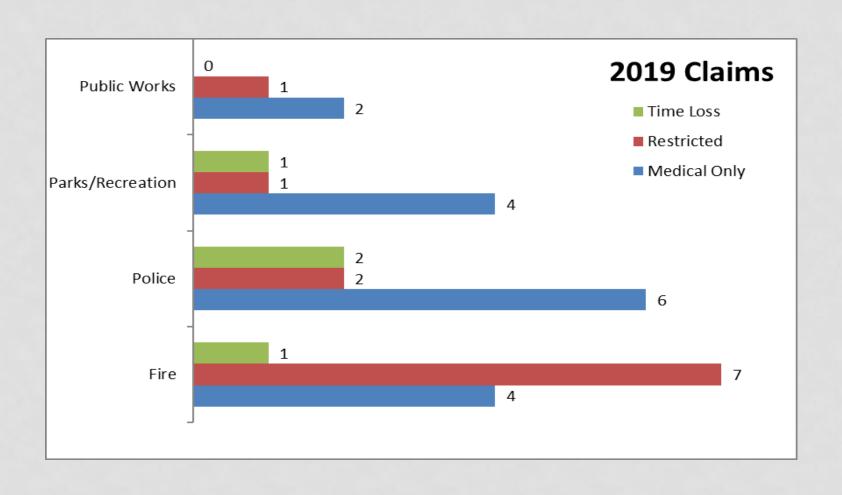

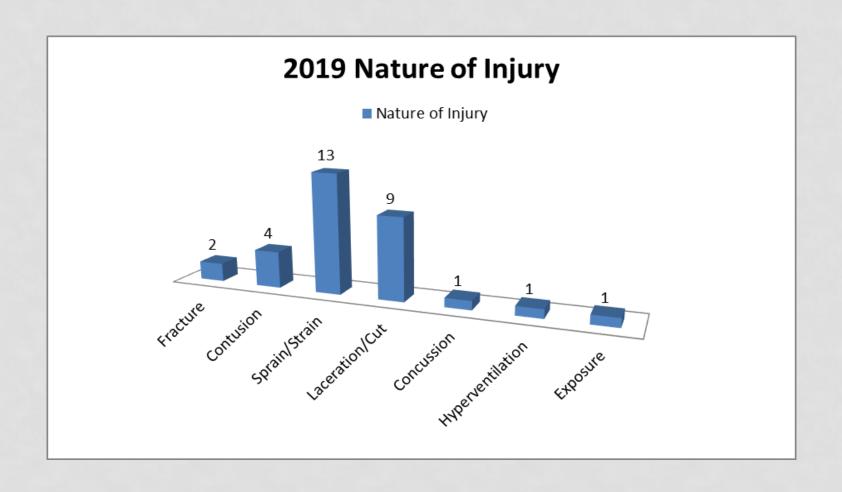

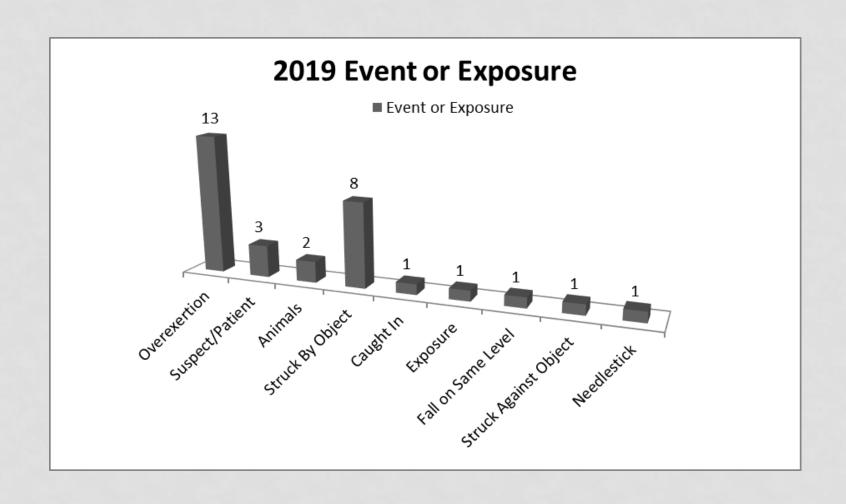
2019 SUMMARY OF CLAIMS



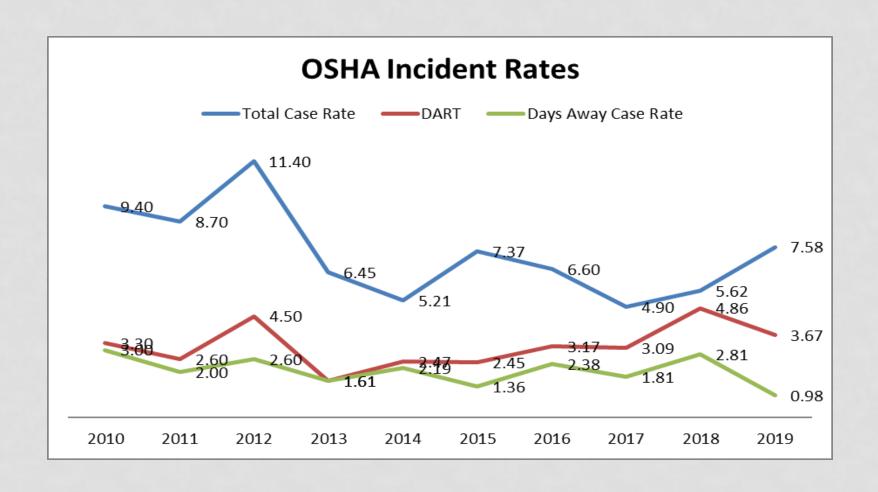
2019 SUMMARY OF CLAIMS



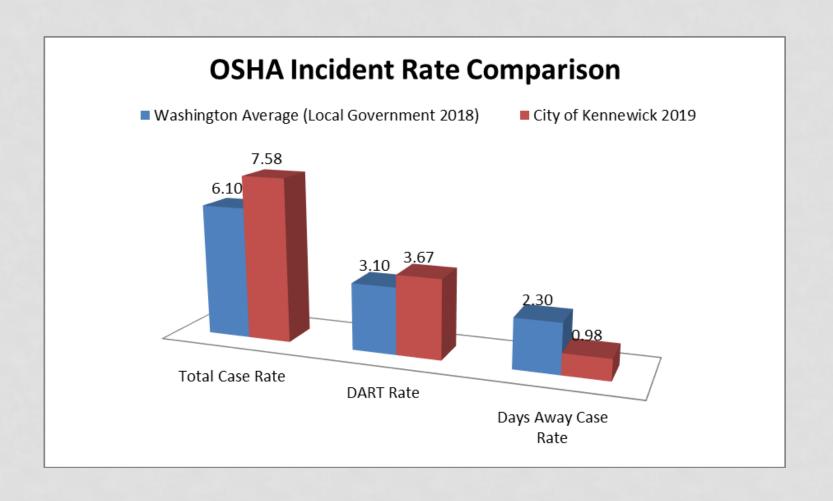

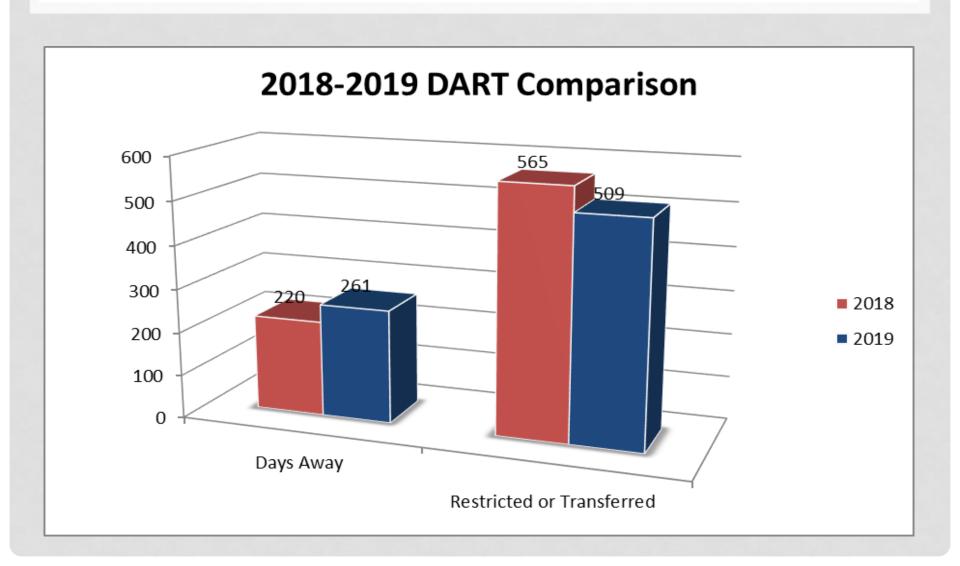
OSHA INCIDENT RATES 2010 THROUGH 2019
